THE POWER OF VULNERABILITY: Creative Writing for Self and System Change

1:45 - 3:15pm

This workshop will serve to familiarize participants with the tool of facilitated writing groups as a method to foster creative self expression, build community across divides, shift personal narratives and generate powerful advocacy from the directly-impacted. Participants will engage in a multi-stage writing exercise culminating in a love letter to self – a prompt the facilitators have employed in multiple women's jails, prisons and reentry programs, Sample writing will include the work of currently incarcerated women and girls, cultivated from the same exercise. This method of generative writing emphasizes personal development, a guided vulnerability that allows various entry points to meet individual needs, offer choice and agency in the creative process and encourage self reflection. After engaging the exercise themselves, the group will share and discuss the methodology in a guided conversation that explores how the multi-step model can be adapted to other prompts and topics, and why expressive programs are valuable in creating both selfempowerment and real-world policy impact.

TEXTILE ARTS AND RESISTANCE - Arpilleras

3:30 - 5:00pm

El Museo del Barrio is honored to share "Arpilleras"- Artworks from the permanent collection. These wall hangings are made from scraps of fabric and depict life under the oppressive Augusto Pinochet dictatorship during the 70's and 80's in Chile. Sewn by anonymous Chilean women, the "Arpilleras" became a popular art form in the 70's. Known as "Arpilleristas", the women created these artworks as a way of expressing their personal experiences and viewpoints, denouncing a political regime dominated by violence, fear and economic hardship. Inspired by the bravery and the creative brilliance of women in Chile. Participants will have an opportunity to create a mini Arpillera that aims to honor and support the struggle for justice of women and girls. They may create an abstract or figurative composition sewing or gluing fabric and fibers onto a backing.
